## Neighbors Mourn Two Men Who Died in NYC Basements During Deluge OCT 31, 2025 (https://www.thecity.nyc/)

A day after two men died in flooded basements in Brooklyn and Manhattan, locals reckoned Friday with the aftermath of the city's latest torrential downpour.

During the rainstorm, as water rushed down Kingston Avenue, a 39-year-old victim entered the basement to save one of his dogs, according to resident Kenneth Oates. "He went for one dog and he never came back," Oates said. "He gave away his life."

The Department of Buildings issued a **vacate** order for the building cellar, and Con Edison shut power at the request of the Fire Department because the basement was completely flooded. The waterline was visible at the top of the stairs leading to the basement, where FDNY divers recovered the body of the man around 4:30 p.m. on Thursday.

Shanna, a resident who has lived in the building for three years, is on her way out to take a hot shower elsewhere. "Ask the city to fix the flooded area and clean the drain," she said. "Otherwise, it's a nice area."

The Red Cross offered temporary **shelter** to more than a dozen tenants over the weekend, though some residents said they were considering staying.

In Washington Heights, Juan Carlos Montoya Hernández lost his life in the **boiler room** of a building on West 175th Street. The 43-year-old assistant to the building's super was electrocuted while trying to pump out the flooding basement.

To tenants, he was lovingly known as "El Mexicanito," said resident Jhosmeily Hernández. "He was a good man, hardworking," Hernández said in Spanish.

Employees of a nearby bodega who were friends of Montoya Hernández set up a small **memorial** in the window, with flowers, two votive candles, and a photo with a handwritten note: "R.I.P. Carlitos."

The city experienced widespread flooding Thursday late afternoon, with commuters navigating through knee-deep water which also seeped into buses and the subway system.

Forecasts had predicted between 1.5 and 2 inches of rain between 2 and 10 p.m., but an inch fell in 10 minutes.

The intensity of an inch of rain in 10 minutes is about equal to six inches in an hour, according to the Department of Environmental Protection, more than four times what the sewer system can handle on average.

Extreme bursts of rain are expected to become more common and more intense due to climate change.
